Just pouring bleach or hot water won't suffice.

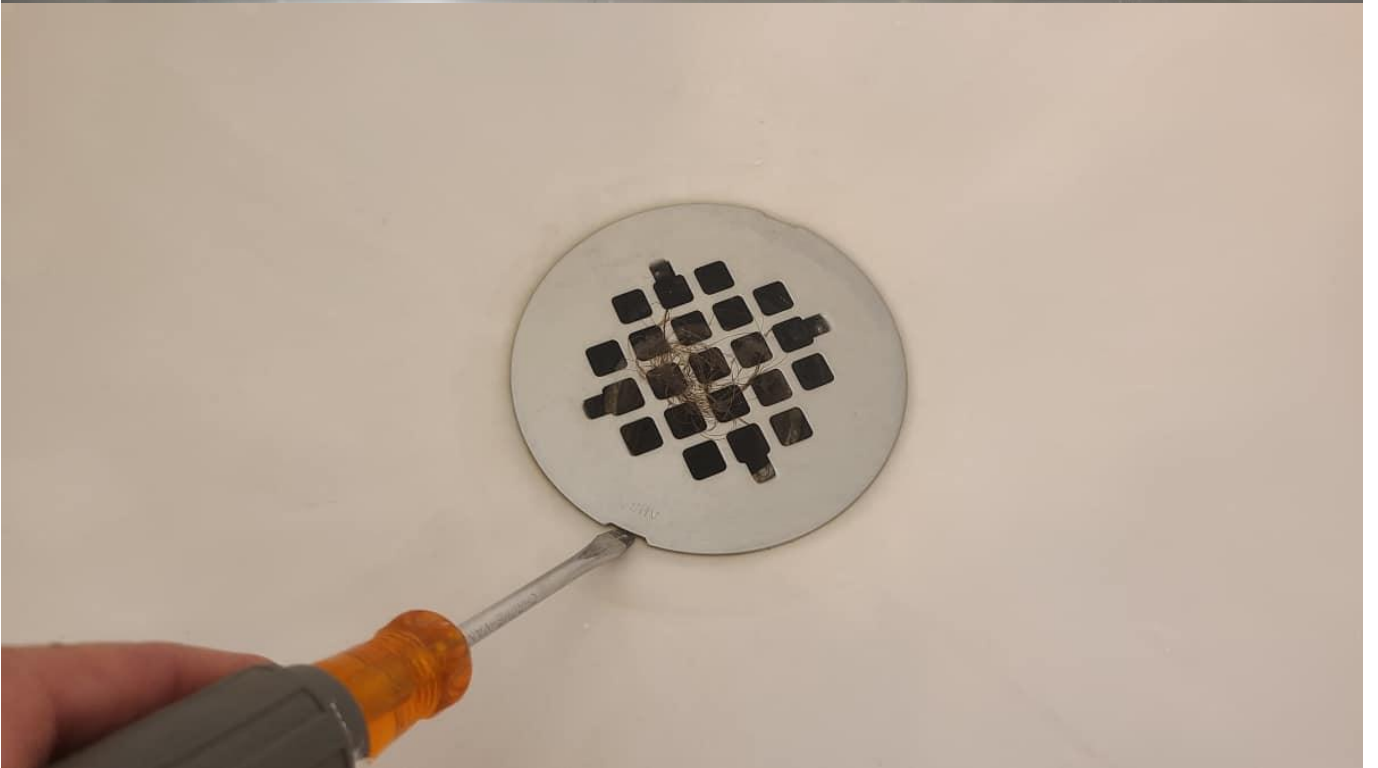
