Instead of starting over from scratch every season, you establish a solid base that grows stronger over time.

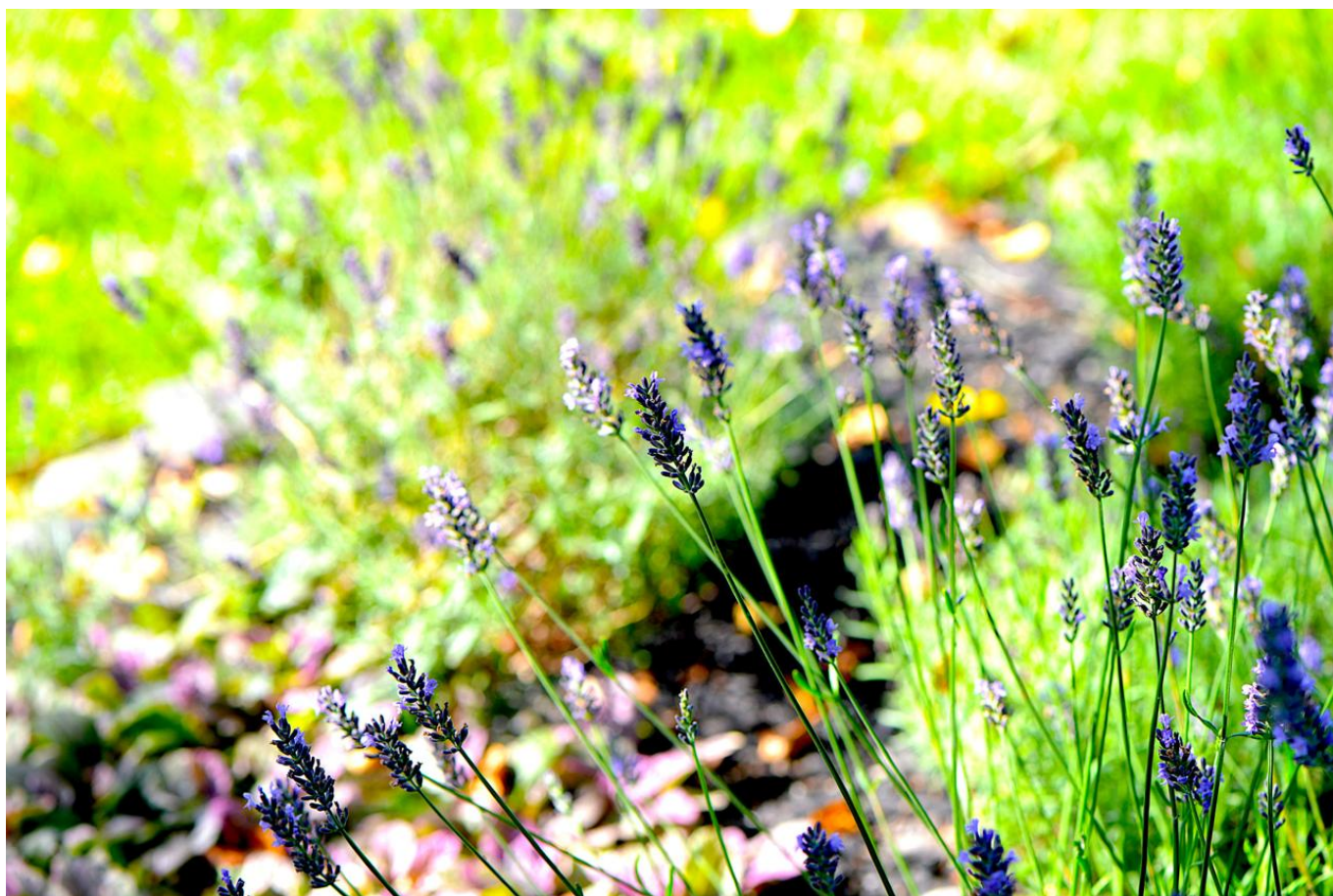

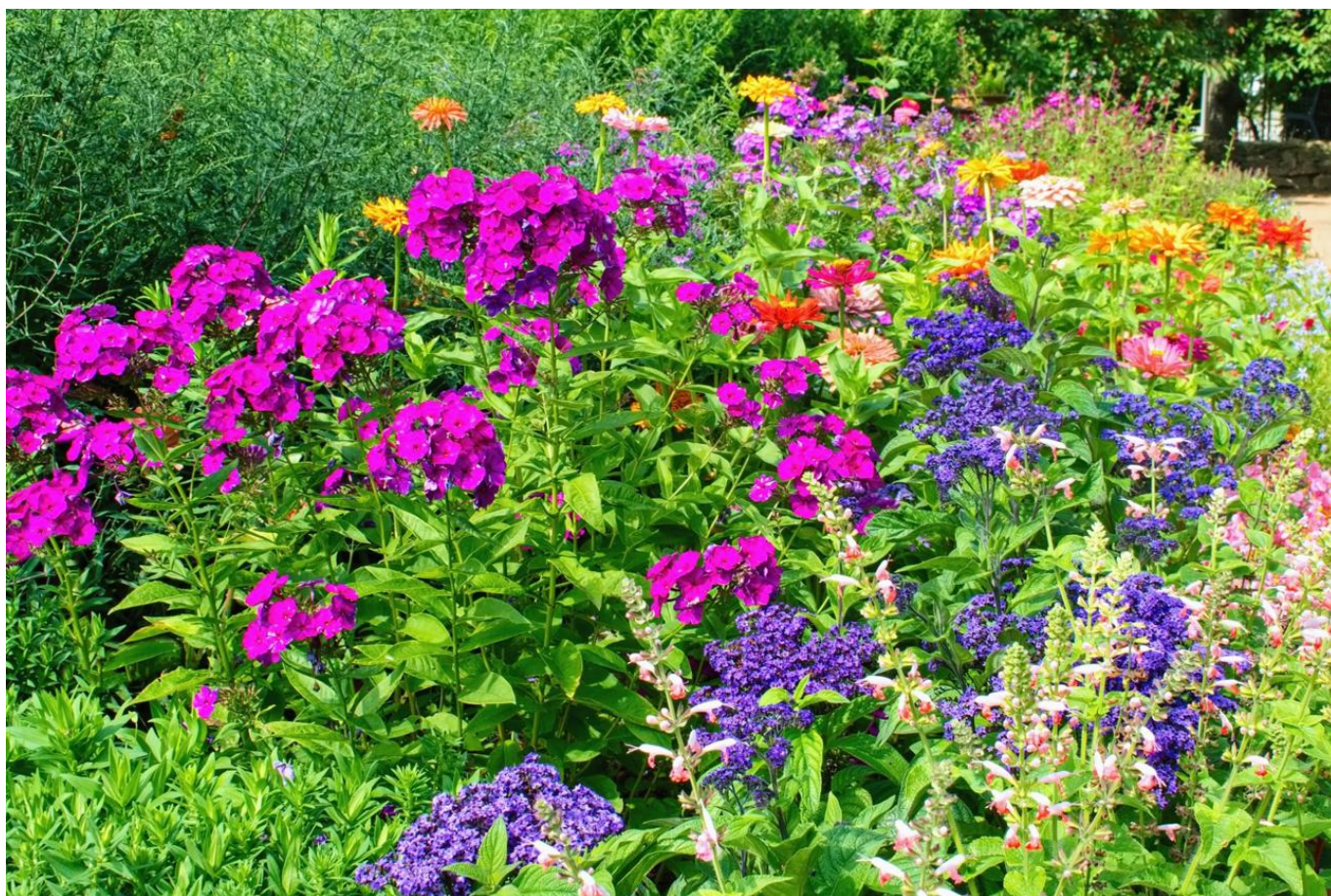

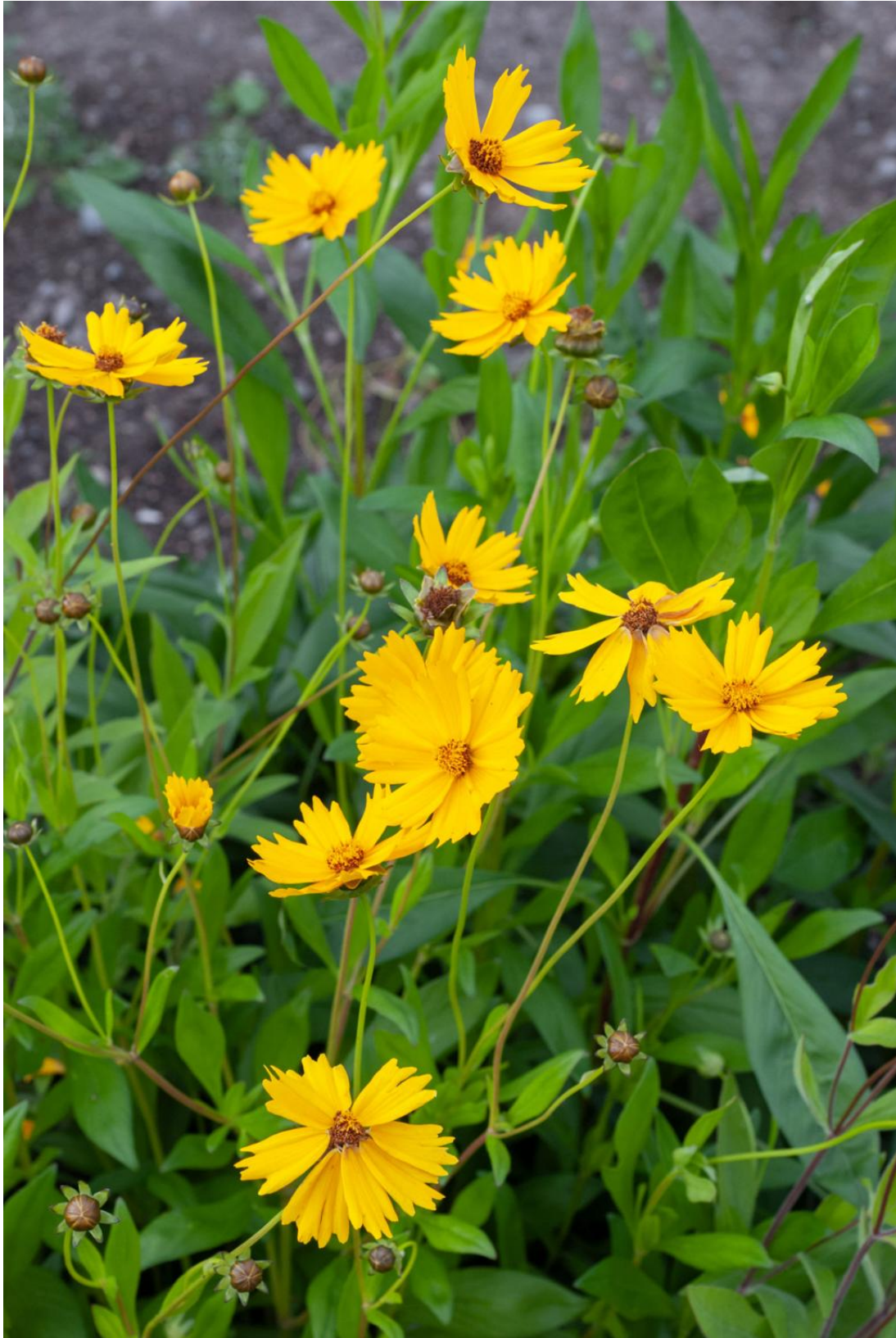
